Rare two-headed turtle hatches at Barnstable nesting site, wildlife hospital says

The Cape Wildlife Center shared on its social media pages Sunday afternoon that the diamondback terrapin hatched from a protected nesting site in Barnstable and was brought to the hospital by members of the Barnstable Natural Resources Department. The hatchling has a condition known as bicephaly, a rare anomaly that can occur from both genetic and environmental factors that influence the embryo during development. Similar to conjoined twins, the turtles share parts of their body and also have some that are independent. In this case, they have two heads and six legs. Both sides of the turtle were very alert and active when the hatchling was admitted to the Cape Wildlife Center, and both sides continue to be bright and active in just over two weeks of hospital care. **Read More**

The Outlook: When will autumn turn over a new leaf?

Fall foliage, such as it is, is finally here as daylight shrinks toward 11 hours by week's end. But, the colors are muted due to the lack of cold nights and light frosts that accelerate the breakdown of chlorophyll as green leaves segue to yellow and red. Above-normal daytime highs and mild overnight lows will continue in the days ahead, meaning that the landscape will turn brown and leaves will continue to drop without reaching their typical fall splendor. **Read More**

To save forests, researchers are hooking trees up to Twitter

Can a network of tweeting trees help us cut carbon emissions and increase empathy for ecosystems? Scientists think so. In July 2018, a century-old red oak went live on Twitter. The account @awitnesstree, tweeting from the Harvard Forest in Petersham, Massachusetts, introduces itself in its bio: "Witnessing life as a tree in a changing environment for more than a century. Views are my own – sort of (data translated by scientists and communicators at HF)." The tree's messages are based on data from a suite of sensors on and around its trunk, using a real-time approach to tree monitoring pioneered by Witness Tree's inspiration and sister project TreeWatch.net. The sensors fitted to Harvard's Witness Tree include a ribbon embedded in its trunk to track water flow, a spring-loaded pin pushing against its bark to monitor shrinkage and swelling and a camera to capture leaf growth. Continuous data streams from these sensors tell us how the tree is affected by changes in its immediate environment. **Read More**

Biden will restore protections to East Coast's only marine national monument

President Biden announced that he will restore protections to the Northeast Canyons and Seamounts Marine National Monument, a nearly 5,000-square-mile area southeast of Cape Cod. The restored protections, which Biden will sign on Friday, will prohibit commercial fishing in the monument, with fishing for red crab and American lobster phased out by September 15, 2023. Recreational fishing in the monument will still be allowed. Former President Barack Obama originally established the conservation area in 2016, creating the country's first and only marine monument in the Atlantic Ocean. **Read More**
